

When Jesus walked the earth, people thronged to him, particularly those with a great need. They believed fervently, or perhaps just hoped desperately, that he could help them. As they came face to face with Jesus, they pleaded, “O Lord, have mercy on me.”

Jesus, filled with mercy, could not stay his hand. He saw their hardship and suffering and had compassion on them. He healed them, blessed them, forgave them, and taught them. And the people went away rejoicing, filled with gratitude and love, their burdens lifted and their peace restored.

At Catholic Community Services of Southern Arizona, many people in great need come to us, and though the words are different, they are asking for mercy. And we, taught by the example of Jesus, know how to respond.

Feed the hungry. Give drink to the thirsty.

Clothe the naked. Shelter the homeless.

Visit the sick and imprisoned. Welcome the stranger.

These acts, the corporal works of mercy, help people meet their most basic needs, but in truth, they do more than that, for an act of mercy is not contained in the act alone, but in its impact. When people’s pleas for mercy are answered, they are filled with love. And when their needs are met, they are filled with peace.

We witness every day, every month, every year how mercy, love, and peace are multiplied in the lives of the people we serve. This is what we witnessed this year:

HAPPY AND THRIVING CHILDREN AND YOUTH

- Children gained new skills, found new friends, enjoyed positive activities, and learned from caring teachers and mentors.
- Joyful families were formed and expanded through adoption.
- Foster families were supported in caring for their vulnerable foster children.
- Parents with patterns of abuse or neglect learned how to better raise, care for, and love their children.

STRONG AND SECURE INDIVIDUALS AND FAMILIES

- Families at risk of homelessness worked toward getting ahead in life with the help of a case manager and the security of affordable housing.
- Families contributed to their financial stability through financial education and life skills classes, matched savings accounts, homebuyer workshops, tax education and assistance, and micro-loans for small family businesses.
- Parents healed from substance abuse problems, increased their coping skills, and experienced personal growth.
- Individuals and families learned to manage their life and mental health challenges through counseling.
- Young pregnant and parenting teens learned to overcome their past lives, become good mothers, and work toward a positive future.

HEALTHY AND INDEPENDENT SENIORS

- Seniors enjoyed nutritious meals, enriching activities, and the companionship of friends at senior centers, while homebound seniors and people with disabilities received not only home-delivered meals, but the comforting visits from caring deliverers.
- Low- and middle-income seniors lived in safe, comfortable, and affordable homes and enjoyed social and educational opportunities.
- Seniors stayed independent in their own homes with the help of case managers and caregivers.
- Seniors and others with intellectual disabilities enjoyed friends, activities, and personal nursing care at our adult day health program, while freeing their caregivers to work and meet other needs.
- Catholic seniors living in retirement communities and nursing homes, staying in the hospital or in hospice remained comforted by and connected to their faith and church community.

SUCCESSFUL AND INTEGRATED REFUGEES AND IMMIGRANTS

- Refugees began building new lives through assistance in moving into a home, finding jobs, enrolling in school, learning English, and learning how to be an American.
- Immigrants gained valuable information on immigration issues and were able to move forward efforts to obtain legal status and work authorization and to reunite with family members.

FULFILLED AND HOPEFUL PEOPLE WITH DISABILITIES

- Deaf, DeafBlind, and Hard of Hearing people overcame barriers to communication, employment, independence, and a hopeful and meaningful life through comprehensive support services.
- Deaf, DeafBlind, and Hard of Hearing individuals and families learned to manage their life and experienced a safe environment through Domestic Violence Education, Life Skills Training, environmental support personnel, communication equipment and a connection to community resources.
- Individuals with disabilities enjoyed friends and social opportunities, and lived with dignity and independence through residential support services that best accommodated their needs and desires.

SUPPORTED AND STRENGTHENED PEOPLE IN CRISIS

- Women, men, and children experiencing domestic violence found safety, shelter, and support as they worked to live free of violence.
- Struggling families were able to meet their needs with gifts of food, clothing, and household and personal hygiene items.
- Migrants in the custody of Immigration and Customs Enforcement found hospitality, compassion, rest, and aid through the efforts of Alitas volunteers and donors.
- Men, women, and juveniles in prison found peace, forgiveness, and connection to God and the church, as well as assistance in starting over outside prison.

PIO DECIMO CENTER

Mercy, Love, and Peace Multiplied

Pio Decimo Center, a community center in one of Tucson's oldest neighborhoods, provides childcare, youth development programs, transitional housing, senior housing, housing counseling, asset-building, financial education, and basic needs assistance.

- 364 children and youth, ages 3 to 18, participated in Pio Decimo's pre-school, after-school, and youth-at-risk programs.
- 34 families with 42 adults and 85 children lived in Pio Decimo's transitional housing and received case management to help them improve their finances, education, employment opportunities, and parenting.
- 13 families purchased homes; 10 became first-time homebuyers through matched savings established in individual development accounts (IDAs), 2 families moved from transitional housing to purchasing a home, 1 family was able to buy their home with down payment assistance.
- 9 families continue to save for home ownership and 1 individual is going back to school for post-secondary education with funds saved through their IDA.
- 1,039 people participated in tax education workshops through the Assets for Families program.
- 77 families participated in financial education classes/life-skills 8 week workshop series. 65 families participated in homebuyer workshops.
- 126 families participated in classes to avoid foreclosure and repair distressed mortgages; 66 of these families were able to stay in their own homes.
- 2,265 families in need received 4,593 food boxes and more than 30,584 clothing, household and hygiene items.
- Volunteers and staff prepared 7,104 tax returns for low-income families, resulting in nearly \$10.6 million in tax refunds, including \$5.6 million in earned income tax credits.
- 130 low- and middle-income seniors lived in a safe, comfortable, and affordable home through Pio Decimo's senior housing and enjoyed 150 social and educational opportunities provided by Pio Decimo Center.





Homeless

NO MORE

Life has not been easy for Carmen, but she has always stayed positive, counting her blessings and sharing her love and kindness with many others—even when she became homeless at the age of 61. Due to Tucson's 42-day bus strike in the late summer of 2015, Carmen could not get to work and lost the two jobs she depended on to support herself. Within a few months, she was evicted from her apartment. She was scared and alone, but she tried hard not to let those feelings overcome her. Carmen spent her days doing odds jobs and volunteering at the Armory Senior Center, as she had done before, and even began volunteering at Pio Decimo Center. Most nights, she stayed in a homeless shelter, though some nights she had to stay outdoors. Fortunately, her plight did not go unnoticed. The senior housing staff at Pio learned of Carmen's situation and found that she was almost 62, the minimum age necessary to live in Pio's permanent housing for low-income seniors. They processed the paperwork right away, and within weeks of her 62nd birthday in February, Carmen moved into her new home. She enjoys the closeness she now has with the other seniors, particularly those who feel lonely. And she's grateful for the greater security she now has with a rent she can afford with the work opportunities she has. "I'm very comfortable knowing I won't be homeless again."

TUCSON

Mercy, Love, and Peace Multiplied

Catholic Community Services – Tucson reaches well beyond the city to serve Pima, Pinal, and Gila Counties. Programs across these counties vary to include counseling, adoption and foster care services, assistance to immigrants and refugees, group living for pregnant or parenting teens and their infants, family strengthening services, and services for seniors including meals and case management.

- 550 children in DCS custody were adopted by loving families, through St. Nicholas of Myra Center.
- 13 infants were adopted through our Infant Adoption program.
- 11 teens, either pregnant or parenting, and 9 babies lived at Merilac Lodge, where the mothers learned about parenting, communication, and self-development.
- 327 seniors received 3,121 hours of case management services and 267 hours of caregiver support services in Pinal and Gila Counties.
- 200 foster children were cared for by licensed foster families in Pinal County. 10 of the children were adopted by the foster family.
- 2,139 seniors in Pima and Pinal Counties enjoyed 180,956 home-delivered or congregate meals served by the Senior Nutrition Program.
- 32 families involved with DCS received 706 supervised visits between parents and their children living in out-of-home care.
- 192 immigrants received immigration assistance. 286 consultations for assistance were recorded over a 6-month time frame.
- 123 refugee families from 13 countries received re-settlement and adjustment services.
- 333 individuals received 2,801 hours of individual, couples counseling, family counseling or therapeutic supervised visits for families referred by Pima County Superior Court.
- 55 families became more economically stable through our Santa Cruz Project.





A New Direction FOR A YOUNG MOTHER

Moriah's mother was a drug addict for as long as Moriah could remember, and it took a huge toll on her young life. At 13, Moriah was taken into foster care. She moved from group home to group home, finding nothing to calm the raging inside her. After four years in foster care, she ran away to rejoin her mother, got addicted to meth, and started a destructive cycle all over again with her own 7-month-old baby girl. A tip-off to police, however, set her on a different course. They gave her a choice: lose her child or go with her child to live at CCS-Tucson's Merilac Lodge and get her life in order. Moriah was determined to keep her baby and chose Merilac Lodge, but she wasn't happy about the conditions; she hated the rules, the expectations, the drug tests and treatment, the classes, the limitations on her time with her daughter. But slowly, as she got sober, and with the constant support and love of the staff, Moriah began to see that a better life was possible. She learned things—how to resolve conflicts, parent her child, and manage money. She saw that a life free of drugs was just a whole lot easier. After two years at Merilac Lodge, Moriah got full custody of her daughter and moved into her own apartment, things she never could have accomplished without Merilac Lodge. "I don't know where I'd be today or if I'd even have my baby with me. The staff stood by me from day one. I am so grateful to them!"

YUMA

Mercy, Love, and Peace Multiplied

Catholic Community Services - Yuma serves Yuma County with meals for seniors, counseling, domestic crisis services, adult day health care for the elderly and disabled, as well as the Arizona Families FIRST program.

- 53 seniors at Daybreak Adult Day Health Center received 29,482 hours of personal care, nursing, and activities. 37 of the center's seniors were able to maintain or increase their level of self-sufficiency.
- 444 frail or disabled individuals living in their own homes were supported with 51,655 home-delivered meals.
- 603 seniors or people with disabilities were served 21,443 meals at the Yuma North End Community Center.
- 64 parents in the Arizona Families FIRST Program and 88 other community members received over 4,539 hours of counseling and case management to support healing, increase coping skills, and provide a safe environment for personal growth.
- 250 adults and 280 child victims of domestic violence received 8,303 nights of emergency shelter at Safe House, along with counseling, case management, and legal assistance.





Coming Home TO DAYBREAK

When Daniel first came to Daybreak, CCS-Yuma's adult day health program, he was relatively young. A gunshot to his head while he was in his late 30s had disabled him for life. For several years, Daybreak provided the health care and social interaction Daniel needed as well as the respite his wife needed. But when he and his wife moved away from Yuma, Daniel had to say goodbye. He always remembered, however, the good times he had at Daybreak and wanted to return there if he ever moved back to Yuma. Thirteen years later and after a divorce, he did return to Yuma, but not at first to Daybreak. He was placed in an assisted care facility, but did poorly there, becoming very depressed and unwilling to eat. Daniel's sister Pauline was determined to give him a better quality of life. She brought Daniel home to live with her and arranged for Daniel to return to Daybreak. It was a dream come true! It took him a while to adjust, but today Daniel has lots of friends, takes part in activities, and enjoys the meals served to him. Pauline is pleased to see Daniel so happy. "Daybreak is such a bright spot in Daniel's life. It's been a huge contributor to his quality of life for many years. He really loves it!"

SIERRA VISTA

Mercy, Love, and Peace Multiplied

Catholic Community Services – Sierra Vista serves residents in Cochise, Graham, Greenlee, Santa Cruz and Gila Counties with foster care and adoptions, parent aide, and in-home services, as well as domestic crisis services in Cochise and Santa Cruz Counties, and meals for seniors in Cochise County.

- 106 foster families were supported by CCS including 13 new licensed foster homes.
- 313 foster children across all five counties were served through the foster care program.
- 17 adoptions were completed this year.
- 363 men, women and children received shelter, counseling, legal assistance, case management, and community referrals from the three domestic crisis shelters in Southeastern Arizona. An additional 212 people received legal aid and referrals without a shelter stay.
- 27,667 meals were delivered to homebound seniors, and 3,943 meals were provided for seniors at community meal sites.
- 106 families received supervised visitation between parents and their children living in out-of-home care.
- 111 families participated in our In-Home Support Services program – 53 of those families were successful in remaining together or reunifying with their children from foster care.





An Ally

IN A LONG STRUGGLE

When Julie's 10-year-old daughter was removed from her custody because of suspected child endangerment, Julie was beyond devastated. She knew she had mental health issues, but she didn't believe they were affecting her ability to parent her daughter. Either way, she knew that she would do everything the Department of Child Safety (DCS) required to get her daughter back. It was all very daunting, and Julie felt utterly overwhelmed, but she found an ally in the staff members of CCS-Sierra Vista's Family Preservation program. They were supportive, non-judging, and gracious, which meant a lot to Julie as she worked through all the DCS requirements. These included getting mental health treatment and participating in CCS-Sierra Vista's parenting education programs. Julie's separation from her daughter was nearly unbearable, especially since she knew how unhappy her daughter was, but the CCS staff kept her going. With therapy, her mental health improved, and finally, after eight months of separation, Julie was reunited with her daughter and her DCS case was later closed. In reflecting on the whole ordeal, Julie says, "I wouldn't have made it without the people at CCS. They were a light at the end of the tunnel and their generosity and kindness will stay with me forever."

DEAF & RESIDENTIAL SERVICES

Catholic Community Services – Deaf & Residential Services are provided by four organizations in Arizona and New Mexico that seek to maximize independence for people with hearing loss or developmental disabilities. Community Outreach Program for the Deaf in Tucson (COPD) and Albuquerque, NM (COPD-NM) and Valley Center of the Deaf (VCD) in Phoenix provide services for Deaf, DeafBlind and Hard of Hearing persons. The Community Living Program (CLP) in Tucson provides residential living supports to people with developmental disabilities.

Mercy, Love, and Peace Multiplied

- 2,275 Deaf and DeafBlind clients received 33,777 hours of interpreting.
- 55 youth received on-the-job experience through COPD's Summer Youth Employment Program.
- 430 Deaf and Hard of Hearing individuals received vocational services, including on-the-job training and job supports/training, resulting in 366 people obtaining employability skills with various placements to include: nursing care, warehouse work, manufacturing, clerical, and service fields.
- 47 individuals with disabilities received 183,137 hours of residential support services, ranging from a few hours daily of in-home support to 24-hour a day comprehensive care in a licensed group home.
- 580 people received case management and life skills education, counseling, and support services from COPD, COPD-NM, and VCD.
- 105 DeafBlind people received 15,207 hours of support services from COPD, COPD-NM, and VCD trained service providers.
- 66 DeafBlind people received assessment, communication equipment, and training on individualized communication equipment.
- 50 youth received ASL domestic violence education.

Staying CONNECTED WITH THE WORLD

When Elizabeth learned at age 15 that she had Usher Syndrome, she could hardly accept it. She had been born Deaf, and now she learned that her eyesight would slowly deteriorate as she grew older, taking away her independence and leaving her isolated from the world around her. The future looked bleak, but as the years went by, Elizabeth resolved not to let her condition hold her back. She has worked, gone to school, even attended the Helen Keller National Institute, where she learned Braille and how to use new devices to communicate. Elizabeth is now 48, and though her vision is significantly impaired, she is leading a meaningful and productive life. This is made possible through the vital support services provided by Community Outreach Program for the Deaf, New Mexico Office. The most important of these services is the help of a Support Service Provider, a companion trained in tactile sign language who goes with Elizabeth just about everywhere and helps her interact with other people and with the context or environment she's in. COPD also provides Elizabeth with a case manager, interpreting and vocational services, and social activities with the DeafBlind community. Elizabeth is highly active in this community, serving as the president of the DeafBlind Association and working with other similar organizations. COPD's services have had a huge impact on Elizabeth's quality of life, helping her stay connected with the world. "Because of COPD, I'm happier, I have a degree of independence, I have activities and the support I need. They have definitely improved my life!"

THE KOLBE SOCIETY

The Kolbe Society was established to respond to the spiritual needs of the men, women, and youth incarcerated in the many jails, prisons and detention centers within the boundaries of the Diocese of Tucson in southern Arizona. It has expanded to provide spiritual support to the families of the incarcerated, the families affected by crime, as well as the men, women, and youth being released from these institutions.

The Kolbe Society began as a ministry inside the Pima County Jail and has grown to almost 100 volunteers who are ministering in almost all of the jails, prisons and detention centers in the diocese. Today, we offer approximately 70 services per week, ministering to about 900 men, women, and youth each week.

The Kolbe Society follows a Restorative Justice model of service. Father Richard Landry, M.S. offers a special Labyrinth Program to offenders, families of the incarcerated and victims of crime in order to bring about restoration, renewal and reconciliation within the community.

The Kolbe Society also has a ministry that offers sacramental opportunities to inmates, a ministry to their families which provides spiritual support and a shuttle service to help families visit their loved ones who are incarcerated in prisons outside the Tucson area, a Re-entry Ministry to provide support services to people released from prison or jail as they transition back into society, and a Victims Ministry to address the needs of people affected by crime.



THE ST. JEANNE JUGAN MINISTRY WITH ELDERS

This ministry is focused on developing and supporting parish-based ministries throughout the Diocese of Tucson to support the increasingly large numbers of Catholics moving into assisted-living communities. The ministry supports pastors and lead volunteers in recruiting and training ministers to help carry out parish outreach for elders. This includes being Church through visitation and taking the Eucharist to those who are living in nursing homes, staying in the hospital, in hospice care or are otherwise homebound due to illness or mobility challenges.

The program's director, Manny Guzman, coordinates regional trainings and outreach throughout all regions of the Diocese to raise the importance of this work of the Church through development of a Spirituality of Aging. The program's chaplain, Father Ray Ratzenberger, visits nearly 20 nursing homes in the Tucson Metro Area over the course of a month with the assistance of volunteers. The ministry is named after St. Jeanne Jugan, the foundress of the Little Sisters of the Poor who operate skilled living facilities throughout the world for elders.



THE ALITAS PROGRAM

Throughout the year, the Alitas Program continued serving weary migrants after they were released from Immigration and Customs Enforcement (ICE) with temporary legal status. Migrants were brought to Casa Alitas, where they could rest, clean up, eat, find new clothing, review their travel itineraries, and get supplies for their journeys ahead. Last year, the Alitas program assisted 492 families of over 1,130 people, many of whom were unable to stay in ICE detention facilities because of extenuating circumstances such as advanced pregnancy or inadequate English or Spanish skills. The program has also agreed to accept unaccompanied minors who "age out" of youth shelters. Instead of being sent to an adult detention center, the youth can be brought to Casa Alitas where they can stay for a few weeks while volunteers help them contact family members and make travel arrangements.

All of the migrants that have come through the Alitas program have been blessed by its hospitable and welcoming spirit. Kindness and the acknowledgment of their human dignity have strengthened them in a very difficult journey.

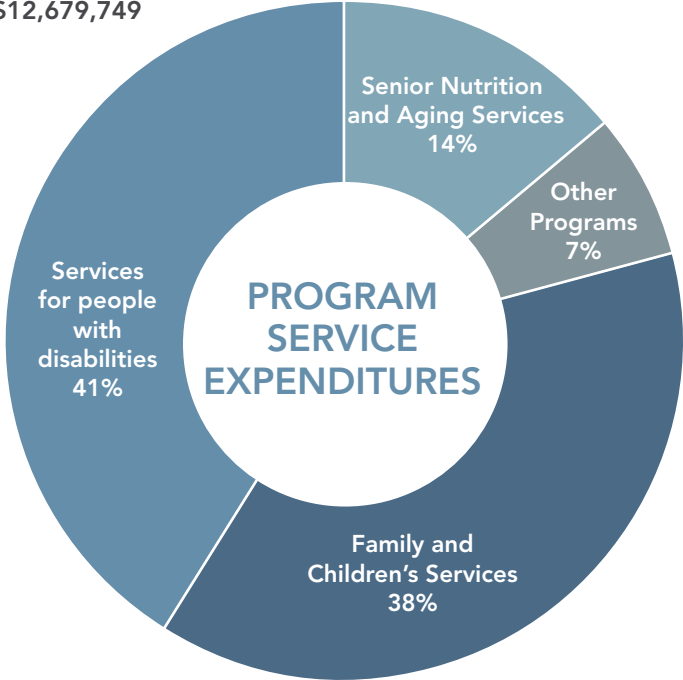
